Cassaria Young was born in Alice Springs, Northern Territory. Her mother is Susan Young, though artists Amani and Stanley Young have looked after her since she was a little baby. Cassaria grew up in Kalka community and attended school in Pipalyatjara. An emerging painter, her works tell the stories of bush trips- digging maku and making cups of tea on the homelands of her grandfather Stanley's country around the Wataru protected area, 100 kms southwest of Pipalyatjara.

Cassaria is a very successful emerging artists and won the Kings School Art Prize in 2022, worth \$20, 000. She is part of a prolific artistic family, including her Grandfather Stanley, her father Timo Hogan and aunt, Carol all of whom exhibit nationally and internationally.
